#### It's All About A Physician's Role in Society




**DR. #### One Book, One Community Read

"One Book, One Community Read has always been an attempt to get people thinking and talking, but this year's selection may be our most controversial book yet; Barbara Kingsolver always takes on provocative topics," says Marge Leonard, OBOCR co-chair. *Unsheltered,* Kingsolver's most recent novel and the Fremont Branch 2018 -19 focal work, raises issues such as "How is it possible that in these times a college -educated couple cannot afford standard housing?" "Has a repressed Cuban society found solutions involving universal education, shared transportation and recycled goods?" And "Who is Mary Treat, and why doesn't she get the attention she deserves?"

In *Unsheltered*, the New Jersey setting links the 19th century to the present. The book's title comes from the underlying premise: To be *unsheltered* allows one "to stand in the clear light of day."



Evening Book Talk next meeting will be on Monday, January 7th @ 7:00 P.M. at the home of



#### International Update -

#### Changes in Botswana Wrítten by Wanda Homen



It was just two years ago that the small country of Botswana celebrated its fiftieth anniversary of independence from Great Britain. It has been highly praised as the greatest success story of Africa. As one can see by looking at the map, this nation is landlocked and on a main trade route. This, of course, puts the country at risk of invasion by its neighbors. At first, its chances for success as an independent country seemed quite slim, but more than fifteen years before Botswana was liberated, an event had transpired that was destined to change its future. It was before the nation of Botswana even existed that this event occurred. What happened was the marriage of a black man to a white woman. Most Africans

were highly prejudiced in those days. The bride and the groom were not unknowns. The man was a royal African prince, Seretse Khama. He married Ruth Williams, a white British woman.

The apartheid regime was especially outraged at Seretse for his interracial marriage. Since the British owned lucrative mining interests in South Africa, they were easily susceptible to political pressure by a powerful apartheid to force Seretse into exile from 1950 to 1956. Returning to his country and later on to politics, Seretse became the first prime minister in Botswana and served from 1966 to 1980. Under his leadership, the nation won its independence from Great Britain in 1966. Seretse seemed to do the impossible He insisted that all individuals should have political freedoms and security without racial discrimination. The successes of that royal African prince made Botswana into a country that was like a dream come true.

However, things have changed since his passing. As of late, domestic violence has led to increased violence of all types to this once highly admired country. Research conducted in 2012 revealed that 67% of the women in Botswana had experienced some form of gender violence in their lifetimes. Women there claim that in the six years intervening,, the situation has only worsened. Violence of all kinds has increased. The dual legal system existing in this country has not helped. Having both common law and customary law in force has proven to be not only confusing but also impractical. It is customary law (the less humane of the two) that makes the decisions in 80% of the cases. It would seem that the beloved Botswana of the famous author, Alexander McCall Smith, is slowly slipping away.
