Kathi makes an important distinctions towards helping members understand our nonpartisan role versus our political role as AAUW. The following is a paraphrase of her explanation:

While we are non-partisan, meaning we do not publicly support any one candidate, etc., that does not mean we are non-political. We have firm political priorities as stated in our AAUW policies. We Advocate (stated within our Mission statement) for our priorities, which means we are supporters, backers, promoters of the causes we want to put forth and made into laws that will accentuate our priorities.

She continues with the explanation that at this point in America's history, one of our political parties consistently pushes bills that align with causes AAUW cares about. The other political party typically has not. We just happen to have the same values as the present Democratic party, therefore having a Democratic majority in the Senate can be advantageous to our AAUW priorities. We will continue to Advocate, Educate and Research to promote gender equity for all women and girls.
