Notice the word Equity in the above IWD campaign theme and in AAUW's mission statement to "advance gender equity" rather than gender equality. What is the difference between the two words? Why is one more appropriate than the other? After all, when growing up we wanted everything to be equal --equal shares of cookies or toys with our siblings.

Here is a quick explanation I found on the Internet: <u>Equality</u> means two cookies for you, two cookies for me. We are each given the same resources--two cookies. <u>Equity</u>, on the other hand, recognizes that each person has <u>different circumstances</u> but is allocated the exact resources and opportunities needed to reach an equal outcome. Example: The cookies are placed on the counter. My taller sibling reaches them easily, but if I am two years old. I can't begin to reach the cookies set aside for me. I have a different set of circumstances-I am shorter! I need the aid of a chair to stand on in order to gain access to the cookies. Equity = equal outcomes.

And one more important date to circle on your calendars: <u>March 31.</u>
