# Changemakers

## Linda Alvarado Visionary Business Trailblazer

My name is Linda Alvarado. I am the founder, president, and CEO of Alvarado Construction, Inc., one of the fastest-growing commercial and general contracting companies in the country based in Denver, CO. I also own the Colorado Rockies baseball team and Palo Alto, a company that runs 150 franchised restaurants in seven states.

I grew up in Albuquerque, NM, with my parents and five brothers in an adobe house with a wood-burning stove for heat and no indoor plumbing. My mother hauled water from a drainage ditch to wash our clothes. Through playing every sport with my brothers, including football, I learned that sometimes you win and sometimes you lose, but you'll always get better if you just keep trying.



I excelled at school, and my parents always encouraged me to try new things. My father even let me work on his car! After graduating with a

degree in Economics from Pomona College in CA, I became an accountant with a construction management company. I worked my way up to project engineer by taking classes such as *How To Run A Construction Site*. I love watching buildings come up out of the ground. To me, they are a permanent and beautiful ending to the creative process.

I began to dream about starting a small construction company of my own, but no banks wanted to finance it. My parents took out a second mortgage and gave me the \$2,500 seed money. At first, I didn't get much work. I started with simple paving jobs like curbs and sidewalks and building bus-stop shelters. Today my company has 450 employees and multi-million dollar projects all over the country and the world. We built the Denver International Airport, Denver Broncos Mile High Football Stadium, and the Colorado Convention Center.

I started serving on the boards of Fortune 1000 companies when I was only 27 years old. I was the recipient of the Horatio Alger Award, inductee of the National Women's Hall of Fame and honored as one of the "100 Most Influential Hispanics in America" by *Hispanic Business Magazine*. Despite all this public acknowledgment of my groundbreaking work, it didn't fully dawn on me how I influenced society's view of women until I spoke at a Career Day for my son's kindergarten class. When his teacher asked my son if he wanted to follow me into the construction business when he grew up, my son said, "No, that's women's work."

I learned that in life, you'll meet people who embrace your dreams and those who will try to stop you. You have to let the disappointments roll off and stay focused. Remember, unless you try, you never know how much you can achieve!



Read the book then watch the film. Discuss which was better. What changes were made that made the movie version better than the book or vice versa?


Some suggestions just off the top of my head: The Color Purple, We Were the Lucky Ones, All the Light We Can Not See, The Boys in The Boat, The Firm.

# Dealing With a Trust

First, I would like to mention that I am not a CPA, accountant or a lawyer. What I write are suggestions from what I have gleaned by experience and a lot of reading.

Did you know that at the beginning of the year the California Uniform Directed Trust Act went into effect?

So what can this mean for you if you have established a trust? You as the grantor of a trust have control of your trust. You might find that a bit overwhelming, especially if your financial concerns are complicated.

What can this trust act do for you?

You are able to establish sub-trusts within your trust. Your child could be the trustee for assets you would like to give your grandchildren. Your child could be a Trust Director for this aspect of your basic trust.

Also if you have a business, you could appoint a Trust Director to handle the business after your death.

Please check with your trust attorney to see what you would need to do to lessen the burden of your basic trust.
