Collective Voices Will Be Heard. 🌋

Gloria L. Blackwell, AAUW president, has this to say about the results of our November National Election.

"I write to you today with conviction and resolve, even though for the second time, our country has decided it wasn't ready to have a highly qualified woman hold our nation's highest office. I am grateful for everyone who stood up and used their voices

for the rights of women and girls, and for the significant wins across states on key issues. To anyone feeling uncertainty about what lies ahead — know that you are not alone. . . .Our strength comes from our collective voice, and together we will continue the work to support women's education and economic empowerment."



Collective Voices! We women raised our voices in the 19th Century at the Seneca Falls Convention, regarded by many as the birthplace of American feminism, which was held in Seneca Falls, New York, on July 19 and 20, 1848. This was the catalyst for women's rights conventions that became annual events, where women met to discuss educational opportunities, divorce reform, property rights, and sometimes labor issues. Sounds like AAUW!

News from National 灐

The National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) is changing. National is outsourcing the program in 2025 to NASPA, which is an organization of student affair administrators. National says the cost of the conference was no longer sustainable. AAUW will still have exhibition space, along with the keynote speech or other presentations at the conference.

In other news, National has been updating branch websites that it hosts. The Fremont branch website (<u>https://fremont-ca.aauw.net</u>) was updated in early November, and it now looks quite a bit different. Several glitches are still being resolved by the branch webmaster, most notably that the text changes from one size to another without warning. Take a look.

Speaking of updating, the Community Hub has been streamlined to simplify the membership sign-up process, and finance officers are now notified when a member renews their membership online. As a side note, dues for fiscal year 2025 remain unchanged.

The California Online Branch asked the Public Policy co-directors to present a branch program regarding Project 2025. There was such great interest in this subject that the branch asked AAUW California if their Zoom account could be used, allowing for more attendees and a webinar. Next they asked if the entire California membership could be invited, then they invited Online branches of other states. Thanks to Amy Hom, Missy Maceyko, AAUW California, and all the work behind the scenes by the Communication Committee, what started out to be a program for maybe 30 branch members ended up being an outstanding webinar on Project 2025 and How it Would Impact AAUW Public Policy Priorities with about 225 attendees! Click here for the video and the presentation. . . . AAUW-CA had a successful legislative session. All three of our A-priority bills were signed into law, along with two of our B-priority bills and one Cpriority bill, a success rate of 86.2%.

In spite of our agonizing history, Native American people find much to celebrate. The songs, dances, culture, and traditions surrounding planting and harvest, the prayers sent upward for healing and peace, and the welcoming of children into our families are all reasons for us to keep moving forward with optimism.

I am a proud member of the Pueblo of Laguna tribe, which has lived on the land that is now New Mexico since 1200. When President Biden appointed me as Secretary of the Interior in 2021, I became the first Native American to serve as a cabinet secretary. My responsibility is to oversee public lands and manage the U.S. government's treaties and legal obligations to 574 Native American tribes.



I was born into a military family. My mother, a member of the Pueblo of Laguna tribe and a Navy veteran, served 25 years

at the Bureau of Indian Affairs. My father was a 30-year combat Marine who was awarded the Silver Star Medal for saving six lives during the Vietnam War. We moved 13 times before we settled in Albuquerque!

After graduating from high school, I spent 10 years earning minimum wage decorating cakes for a living. But one day, I looked in the mirror and realized I wanted more, for me and my people. I saw too many Native Americans struggling, and I realize we should have a voice in who our elected officers are. When I was 28 years old, I enrolled at the University of New Mexico to earn a BA degree in English.

I became interested in politics because I really wanted more Native Americans to get out and vote. I started a business to sell homemade salsa to put myself through law school. In 2018, I won a seat in the House of Representatives and became the first Native American elected to Congress. I served on the House Committee of Natural Resources, championing environmental protection, climate action, and universal health insurance before President Biden appointed me to my current position which also oversees the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

Growing up in my mother's Pueblo household, I never imagined a world in which I would be represented by someone who looked like me. I think it's important to always have diversity in all walks of life. If anyone can say, "Go back to your country, " it's the Native Americans. However, we would never ask anyone to go back to where they came from because it contradicts the ideals we stand for.

#### Money, Money, Money:

"Snowballing" Can Reduce Debt 📌

The Holiday Season is here and the snow is falling up in the Sierras.

So let's discuss snowballing. With Christmas the time of extravagance, how do we reduce and perhaps get our credit cards to a zero balance?

Are you ready for the battle? Snowballing is an approach to reduce credit card debt.

How to approach it: First look at your credit card balances. If you pay all of them off every month, you do not have to try snowballing. But for some of you who have balances that never seem to go down, this might be your way to a better financial future.

First, find the card with the lowest debt. Get that card paid off. When that card is finally down to a zero balance, then start to get the next card paid off completely. Every card you manage to get to a zero balance will no longer have interest charges. Eventually your balances on your credit cards will melt away.

Now the big hurdle is to completely pay your balances in full every month and never carry a balance over and pay any interest again.
